

## Living address verification form

To be submitted in support of enrolment application

To the parent/caregiver of the applicant,

Cornerstone Christian School's enrolment scheme may be downloaded from the school website: www.cornerstone.ac.nz/enrolment-scheme.

The enrolment scheme requires for distance from the school to be a factor in determining the ranking of all applicants for enrolment. It is therefore important that the living address held on the school database will be the applicant's usual residence when they start school at Cornerstone.

If the applicant's living address should change after this form is submitted the school must be notified. This should be done by email: <a href="mailto:enrol@cornerstone.ac.nz">enrol@cornerstone.ac.nz</a>.

We need to be sure that the living address provided is genuine. In addition to providing a document showing proof of the living address, it will assist us if you complete the following questionnaire. If an issues arises we may contact you to further assist us to assess the genuineness of the living address.

## Please read the information below and sign over the page to acknowledge that you have read it.

The living address details held on the school database at the close of the pre-enrolment period must be the applicant's usual place of residence when the school is open for instruction.

This means that if you currently live in Zone 1 but move out of Zone 1 before your child's first day of attendance at the school, your child will not be entitled to enrol at the school.

The Ministry of Education has advised that parents should also be warned of the possible consequences of deliberately attempting to gain unfair priority in enrolment by knowingly giving a false address or making a living arrangement which they intend to be only temporary, e.g.

- Renting accommodation on a short-term basis, or
- Arranging temporary board with a relative or family friend, or
- Using the living address of a relative or friend as an "address of convenience", with no intention to live there on an ongoing basis.

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Before enrolment takes place (i.e. before attendance begins), if the Board of Trustees has reasonable grounds for believing that the in-zone address will not be a genuine, on-going living arrangement, the board may withdraw any offer of a place which it may have made on the basis of the given living address.

After attendance has begun, if the school learns that a student is no longer living at the in-zone address given at the time of application or the closing of the pre-enrolment period and has reasonable grounds to believe that a temporary in-zone residence has been used for the purpose of unfairly gaining priority in enrolment at the school, then the Board may review the enrolment. Unless the parents can give a satisfactory explanation within 10 days, the Board may annul the enrolment. This course of action is provided for under section 110A of the Education Act 1989.
