Bull-Rush and Climbing Trees

I was pleased to notice the other day that one of our pohutukawa trees had grown big enough so that 3 young children had been able to shimmy their way up the lower branches. They happily called out to me as I passed.

Judging by last week, bull-rush seems to have made a comeback and up to 40 active young lads (and one young lady) are salivating with the prospect of wrestling each other in this game at break times. Just to confirm: I've never banned bulrush or climbing trees in our school and don't intend to - I actually believe these things are important and I'd like to explain why.

Some schools do ban these things, and this is due to concern over safety considerations (or more to the point: the fear of prosecution under the new Health and Safety legislation). Without doubt, these are higher risk endeavours and require close supervision and monitoring to minimise risk of harm, however they are also the types of experiences that young children absolutely need as they are growing up.

Towards the end of winter, many of our young people, and particularly some of our young Y5-9 boys, have "cabin fever". They are growing rapidly, due to their bodies entering puberty and they desperately need to stretch, push and flex these rapidly growing limbs and muscles. Testosterone, the male hormone, which gives rise to aggression, is also starting to flow freely in their bloodstreams at this stage. It can be a time when there are plenty of discipline issues in classes, not because the kids are getting naughty, but just simply because they need to move and be aggressive and stretch as a natural response to their body growing and changing. Games such as bull-rush become very popular for the kids at this stage because it allows them to get all of this out at break times. It has the happy consequence that they then can re-enter the classroom and be ready to learn, rather than pushing each other around in class inappropriately, thereby getting into trouble.

Yes, there are the occasional tears as someone gets hurt, but the hurt person is, almost always, desperate to join the game as soon as they have recovered, and Chris Mitchell and I have been personally monitoring this game closely for safety reasons. I do also find it's a wonderful opportunity to

teach more appropriate social interactions and our value of kindness to the older boys as they learn how to look after the younger ones better. Sometimes, they do take a while to learn this though.

And it's not just bull-rush and climbing trees of course. **Kids need to play**. They do a significant amount of their learning when in free or semi-guided play activities. Our politically correct and risk-averse world seems to have lost this realisation and a generation of children are growing up with over-excessive amount of constraints. It's no wonder they turn to their i-pads for some fun – and then get hooked. There has been some medical conjecture coming from the US recently to suggest that the reasons for the increase in anxiety disorders in children is the removal of risk-prone play activities from their lives.

I've been reading a book recently called "Let the Children Play" and it gives a very thorough research base for the things I'm suggesting. Definitely worth a read if you're interested.



Cornerstone Christian School Ashhurst Bus Service Starting Monday 16th September 2019

Our 2017 bus survey indicated that the majority of Ashhurst and Feilding parents would prefer a school bus service over having to transport their children to and from Cornerstone Christian School by car. Based on these results, we have been working closely with the Ministry of Education to present a case for Cornerstone Christian School Bus services. We were successful in securing a Feilding bus service in 2018. Last Friday we received a notification that, the Ministry of Education had approved the second bus route to and from Ashhurst and were wanting to get underway with this service as soon as possible.

Given that there are many details to sort out, we have suggested that the bus service does not begin until the start of week 9 this term – Monday 16th September 2019.

According to our school records, there are potentially 48 Cornerstone Christian School students living adjacent to, or beyond the proposed bus route that could make use of this bus service. This high number of potential students has allowed us to secure a FREE 'Cornerstone students only' bus. One downside of having the Ministry of Education provide this bus service, is that all parents with an Ashhurst residential address who currently receive a School Transport (conveyance) allowance will lose this at the start of term 4.

The confirmed route for the Cornerstone Christian School Ashhurst Bus Service is as follows:



The dark line above indicates the new bus route – leaving the school bus pickup area in Guildford Street, Ashhurst at 8.20am, with an ETA at Cornerstone Christian School of 8.35am. Please note that at this time all the other secondary buses (e.g. to Freyberg, Girls or Boys High) will have left the Guildford Street area and the Ashhurst bus will be the only one waiting to pick up passengers. We suggest that students avoid the student congestion in the Guildford Street area around 8.00am.

In the afternoon, the bus will leave Cornerstone Christian School at 3.20pm with an ETA back at Ashhurst Guildford Street bus stop of 3.35pm.

All Ashhurst area parents should receive a letter in the mail this week with more information on this service.
